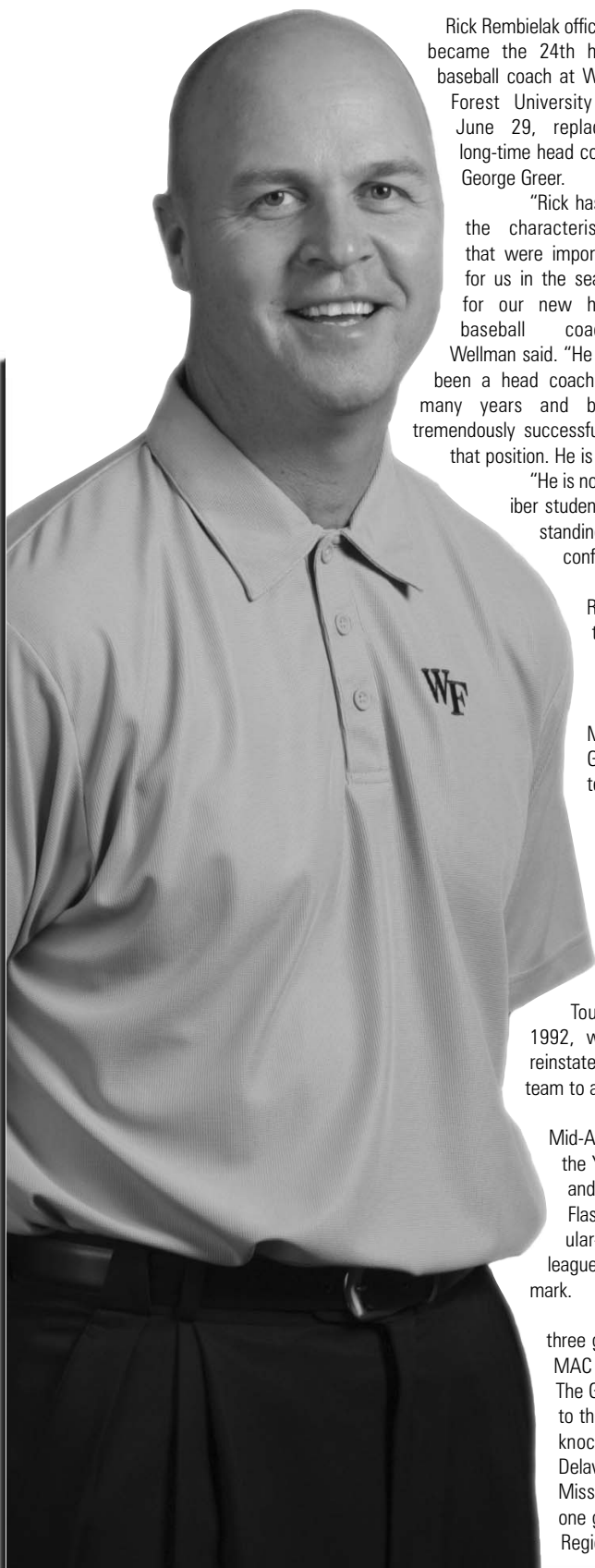
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Rick Rembielak officially became the 24th head baseball coach at Wake Forest University on June 29, replacing long-time head coach George Greer.

"Rick has all the characteristics that were important for us in the search for our new head baseball coach," Wellman said. "He has been a head coach for many years and been tremendously successful in that position. He is as high-quality as they come in the development of collegiate players."

"He is not only recognized as an excellent recruiter, but understands the importance of top-caliber student-athletes, both on the field and in the classroom," Wellman said. "He has an outstanding record in terms of graduating his student-athletes, as well as winning numerous conference championships."

"What attracted me to Wake Forest was the university's excellent reputation," Rembielak said. "It is the perfect combination of academics and athletics. I can not think of a better place to further my career than at Wake Forest. It is an ideal position. My excitement and enthusiasm to start the recruiting process and spread Wake Forest's name is immediate."

Rembielak arrives in Winston-Salem after an 11-year stint with Kent State of the Mid-American Conference (MAC). He is the all-time winningest coach of any sport in Golden Flashes history with a career record of 373-251-1 (.597). Against other MAC teams, Rembielak sports an even more impressive record of 200-100 (.667).

Rembielak won four Mid-American Conference regular season championships and three MAC tournament titles, including this past season's 2004 Mid-American Conference Tournament. The Golden Flashes have made 12 consecutive appearances in the MAC Tournament. Dating back to 1992, when postseason play was reinstated, Kent State is the only MAC team to appear in every tournament.

Rembielak was named the Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year three times (1996, 2000 and 2003). In 1996, the Golden Flashes won the conference regular-season title with a 21-7 league record and a 30-20-1 overall mark.

In 2001, Kent State won three games on the final day of the MAC Tournament to claim the title. The Golden Flashes then advanced to the NCAA Regional where they knocked off Ohio State and Delaware to as finish runner-up to Mississippi State University -- just one game shy of the NCAA Super Regionals.

Coaching Staff

In 2002, Rembielak reached the 300-win plateau for his career when Kent State knocked off Central Michigan, 2-0, on May 24, 2002, in the MAC Tournament semifinals. The Golden Flashes went on to win their third MAC Tournament title.

Rembielak surpassed Danny Hall (current head coach at Georgia Tech) for the most wins in Golden Flashes baseball history when he picked up his 209th win against Toledo on April 9, 2000. In 1996, he recorded his 100th career win in only his 154th game, becoming the fastest Kent State coach to reach the 100-victory mark.

In 2002, Rembielak guided the Flashes to the MAC Tournament crown for the second straight year. KSU dropped two straight games at the South Bend Regional, but recorded 37 victories -- third most in his tenure.

His first team in 1994 team advanced to the NCAA Regional Quarterfinals after the Flashes earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. In 1995, the Kent State's overall record improved to 40-18.

During the 1997 campaign, Rembielak's squad advanced to the championship game of the conference tournament and tallied a 29-28 overall record -- winning 20 of its final 29 contests.

The Golden Flashes finished the 1998 season at 27-28 overall and advanced to the MAC Tournament for the seventh time in as many years.

The 1999 squad again finished with 30-plus wins by ending the season at 33-25 overall and 19-12 in Mid-American Conference play.

The 2000 team claimed the regular-season MAC title and finished 40-18 overall. It was the second time in Rembielak's seven years and sixth time in the program's history that a Kent State team hit the 40-win plateau.

From 1988-93, Rembielak was an assistant coach for the Flashes under Hall. Kent State teams posted a 208-117 (.640) record during that stretch and won MAC titles in 1992 and 1993 -- the program's first since 1964.

Since Rembielak came to Kent State, 51 Golden Flashes have signed pro contracts, including 30 pitchers. A total of 13 former Flashes were

active at some level of professional baseball during 2002.

During Rembielak's coaching tenure, Kent State hurlers have been named MAC Pitcher of the Year seven times (1990, 1992-96, 2003), and MAC Player of the Year and MAC Freshman of the Year twice. In 2001, standout John VanBenschoten became the Golden Flashes' second MAC Player of the Year following Mike Gulan, who won the award in 1992. VanBenschoten was selected eighth overall by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 2001 MLB Amateur Draft.

A former Miami (Ohio) University standout, Rembielak was a three-year letterwinner at short-stop for the Redskins from 1979 to 1981. He helped lead the Redskins to a 36-13-1 conference record, a MAC title in 1979 and a berth in the conference playoffs in 1981.

In 1981, Rembielak was drafted in the 13th round by the Baltimore Orioles. He played with teams affiliated with the Orioles, Chicago Cubs and Milwaukee Brewers. His best professional season was in 1985 with Winston-Salem, a Cubs affiliate. Rembielak helped lead the team to the Carolina League title and was named Most Valuable Infielder.

A Cleveland native who graduated from Central Catholic High School, Rembielak earned a bachelor's degree in business education from the University of Akron in 1988 and earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1992. He is a member of the Greater Akron Baseball Hall of Fame and the Stark County Hall of Fame.

Rembielak, 44, and his wife of 20 years, Sharon have two daughters, Nicole (17) and Megan (15) and a son Matthew (11).

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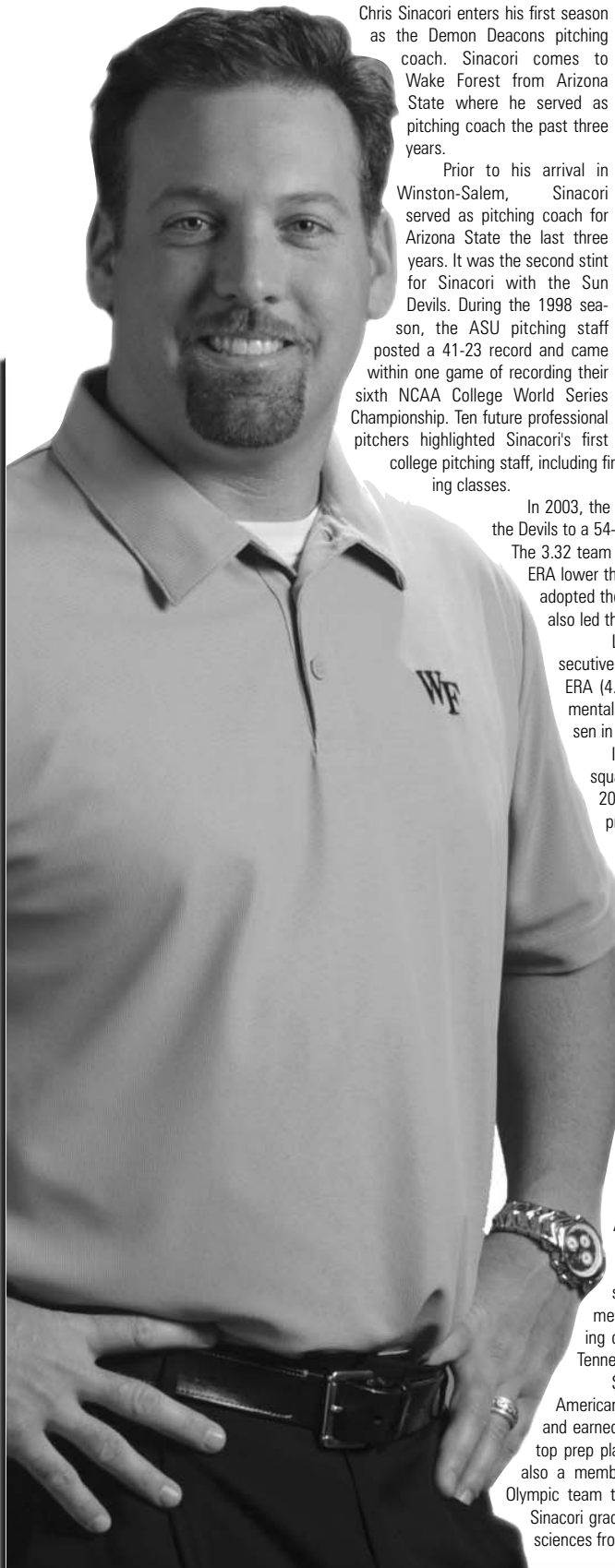
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Chris Sinacori enters his first season as the Demon Deacons pitching coach. Sinacori comes to Wake Forest from Arizona State where he served as pitching coach the past three years.

Prior to his arrival in Winston-Salem, Sinacori served as pitching coach for Arizona State the last three years. It was the second stint for Sinacori with the Sun Devils. During the 1998 season, the ASU pitching staff posted a 41-23 record and came within one game of recording their sixth NCAA College World Series Championship. Ten future professional pitchers highlighted Sinacori's first

college pitching staff, including first-round draft picks Ryan Mills and Jay Gehrke. Sinacori also brought in three top 10 recruit-ing classes.

In 2003, the Arizona State pitching staff became a benchmark for success on the mound. Helping guide the Devils to a 54-14 record, the pitching staff led the Pac-10 with a 3.32 ERA and ranked eighth in the NCAA. The 3.32 team ERA marked the first time since 1990 that an ASU pitching staff finished a season with an ERA lower than 4.00 and is the best dating back to 1979 when ASU joined the Pac-10. Since the NCAA adopted the designated hitter and aluminum bats in 1974, the 3.32 ERA is the third lowest. The Devils also led the Pac-10 with 530 strikeouts, adding to the 1998 strikeout crown Sinacori helped attain.

Last season, the Sun Devils went 41-18 and reached the NCAA Tournament for the fifth consecutive year and eighth time in the past nine seasons. Arizona State finished third in the Pac-10 in ERA (4.71), third in opponents batting average (.267) and first in saves (20). Sinacori was instrumental the rise of Jason Urquidez, who went 12-3 last season with a 3.41 ERA. Urquidez was chosen in the 11th round by the Cincinnati Reds.

In addition, the 2003 pitching staff combined for 10 shutouts to mark the most by a Sun Devil squad since recording 11 in 1976. Six pitchers from Sinacori's 2003 staff were selected in the 2003 MLB Amateur Draft and three more signed free agent contracts. Beau Vaughan, a true project that Sinacori helped develop in his only year as a Sun Devil, was selected in the 3rd round by the Boston Red Sox.

Prior to his second stint at ASU, Sinacori was a pitching coach in the Chicago White Sox minor league system for four years. He was also in charge of the rehabilitation programs throughout the organization for all pitchers. In that time, he mentored eight current big league pitchers (Danny Wright, Jon Rauch, Matt Ginter, Rocky Biddle, David Sanders and Josh Stewart) and six first-round draft picks (Jason Stumm, Ginter, Brian West, Rob Purvis, Kris Honel and Royce Ring). His 2001 (3.35 ERA) and 2002 (3.62 ERA) pitching staffs both finished second in the Arizona League.

Prior to his coaching work with the Sun Devils in 1998, Sinacori spent seven years as a professional player with four different organizations (Los Angeles, Toronto, Florida and Arizona). He was the 15th selection of the Dodgers in the 1991 MLB Amateur Draft. Sinacori learned from some outstanding instructors, as seven of his former pitching coaches are now MLB pitching coaches. Sinacori played two years for Tennessee and one year for FIU.

Sinacori was a two-time USA Today All-American at MacArthur H.S. in Levittown, N.Y., and earned the New York Diamond Award as the top prep player in the state of New York. He was also a member of the 1988 USA Baseball Junior Olympic team that won the gold medal in Australia. Sinacori graduated with a degree in liberal arts and sciences from the University of Tennessee.

Georgia Tech, Palmieri worked primarily with the Yellow Jacket hitters and outfielders. This past season, Palmieri helped all three of the Georgia Tech starting outfielders earn all-ACC honors. He was also instrumental as the Yellow Jackets not only led the ACC in hitting with a .319 batting average, but also helped Georgia Tech to a school record 20 straight victories, the ACC regular season championship and a berth into the NCAA Super Regionals.

Palmieri joined the Tech program after a three-year career in professional baseball with the Anaheim Angels and Montreal Expos. He spent the summers of 2001 and 2002 as an assistant coach in the Cape Cod League, first with the Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox then with the Chatham A's. In 2003, Palmieri was the head coach of the Riverpoint Royals of the NECBL in West Warwick, R.I.

Palmieri's first year at Tech was extremely successful as the Yellow Jackets won a school-record 52 games and advanced to the College World Series. The Yellow Jackets hit .330 as a team, including six regulars who batted .340 or higher, and averaged more than eight runs per game. Georgia Tech was the top hitting team in the 2002 College World Series with a .392 team batting average.

In 2003, Palmieri helped Georgia Tech sweep the first triple-header in Atlantic Coast Conference history as the Yellow Jackets defeated North Carolina, Florida State and NC State to win the ACC Championship.

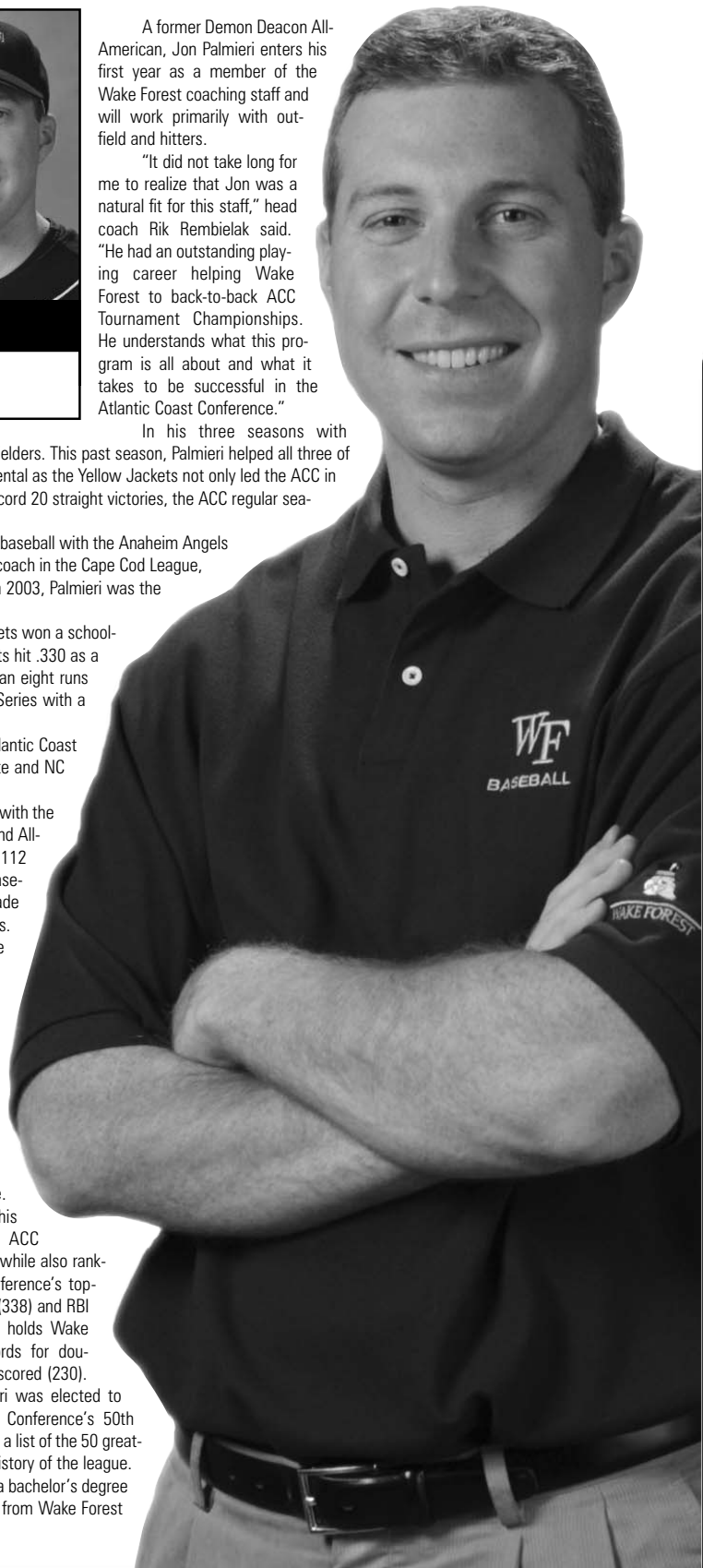
A two-time All-America selection, Palmieri was a standout first baseman with the Demon Deacons from 1998-99. As a senior, he earned first-team All-America and All-ACC honors after batting .412 with 18 home runs, 94 RBI and a school-record 112 hits before being selected in the 14th round by the Angels in the major league baseball draft. In 1998, Palmieri was tabbed a third-team All-America and again made the first-team All-ACC squad after batting .438 with a school-record 30 doubles.

One of the top hitters in ACC history, Palmieri finished his career with the second highest batting average in ACC history (.395) at that time, while becoming just the fifth player in ACC history to collect at least 300 hits, 200 runs and 200 RBI in his career.

A former Demon Deacon All-American, Jon Palmieri enters his first year as a member of the Wake Forest coaching staff and will work primarily with outfield and hitters.

"It did not take long for me to realize that Jon was a natural fit for this staff," head coach Rik Rembielak said. "He had an outstanding playing career helping Wake Forest to back-to-back ACC Tournament Championships. He understands what this program is all about and what it takes to be successful in the Atlantic Coast Conference."

With 112 hits in both 1998 and 1999, he became the just the second ACC player to record back-to-back seasons of 100 hits or more. Palmieri finished his career with an ACC record 82 doubles, while also ranking among the conference's top-five all-time in hits (338) and RBI (241). Palmieri still holds Wake Forest career records for doubles, hits and runs scored (230).

In 2003, Palmieri was elected to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary team -- a list of the 50 greatest players in the history of the league.

Palmieri earned a bachelor's degree in Communications from Wake Forest in 1999.

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Marshall Canosa begins his first full season as an assistant coach on the Wake Forest staff. Canosa will work primarily with the catchers.

"He has a tremendous work ethic and passion for the game of baseball that will fit right in with the rest of our staff," head coach Rick Rembielak.

Canosa, 24, comes to Winston-Salem after one season as a graduate assistant at Tennessee-Martin. He not only worked with the Skyhawk catchers and hitters, but also served as the strength and conditioning coach. This past summer, Canosa was an assistant coach for the Falmouth Commodores of the Cape Cod League. The Commodores captured the West Division Title and defeated Hyannis in the divisional playoffs before losing to the Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox in the championship series.

Prior to his stint at UT-Martin, Canosa spent the summer of 2003 as an assistant coach with the Metro (NY) Cadets of the Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League.

Canosa played collegiately at Villanova after transferring from Akron. At Villanova, Canosa was a three-year starter at catcher and was a crucial component of the Wildcats line-up with his great defense and expertise in managing the pitching staff.

A native of Pine Bush, N.Y., Canosa earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education with a concentration in social studies from Villanova in 2003.

Athletic Administration



Ron Wellman, who has elevated Wake Forest University athletics to its highest level ever and committed to preparing the program for greater success in the future, enters his 13th year as director of athletics.

Wellman, who was officially named athletic director in October of 1992, is the fifth man to assume the top position in the athletic department at Wake Forest during the modern era of intercollegiate sports, following Pat Preston, Jim Weaver, Bill Gibson and Dr. Gene Hooks, WFU's athletic director from 1964 through 1992.

Since taking over control of WFU Athletics, Wellman has seen Deacon athletic teams rise to national prominence in several sports while perennially competing for Atlantic Coast Conference championships. The 2002-03 academic year - a banner year by any definition - was the evidence.

In June, Wellman received the prestigious honor as the Division IA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year from the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Off the playing fields, Wellman has spearheaded an effort for the overall development of the student-athlete. He asks his coaches to stress academics and Wellman has instituted programs to assist and develop student-athletes away from competition such as the annual Academic Excellence Banquet, a campus-wide affair which honors those student-athletes who have achieved in the classroom.

Another obvious sign of the progress Wake Forest has made under Wellman's leadership is the ambitious facility improvement program that the athletic department has undertaken.

The most recent construction project was that of new office and meeting space for the Deacon football team and staff. WFU varsity coaches have

modern and spacious offices, all housed near to their teams' practice facilities, dressing areas and academic counseling center. Spry Stadium, WFU's campus soccer facility, provides the school with one of the finest practice and competition arenas for that sport in the country. The varsity tennis teams and entire Winston-Salem community benefit from a state-of-the-art Indoor Tennis Center.

And, of course, there is the spectacular Bridger Field House at Groves Stadium, which provides support to every varsity team as well as the athletic department administration and entire university.

The Kenneth D. Miller Center, which opened its doors in September, 2001, provides additional space for the Student-Athlete Services and CHAMPS programs, as well as a new state-of-the-art practice facility for the Demon Deacon men's and women's basketball teams. The Miller Center also includes a spacious fitness center, which is available for use by all students, faculty and staff.

The dean of all ACC athletic directors, Wellman has also taken an active role on the national level. Wellman serves on the NCAA Division I Management Council. Recently he served as chairman of the NCAA Baseball Committee and directed the implementation of a new and expanded national tournament format, creating significant interest in that event. Wellman also serves as VP of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

Wellman's successful career in college athletics includes both coaching and administration on a variety of levels.

Born in Celina, Ohio, he earned his undergraduate degree from Bowling Green State University, where he was a pitcher on the varsity baseball team.
